RED EYE SHOULD ALWAYS BE MEASURED - IT COULD SAVE YOUR PET'S VISION

Most eye diseases cause redness of the eye. Fast, discreet measurement supplies important information; high or low eye pressure may often be the only distinctive symptom between serious and harmless eye problems.

GLAUCOMA IS A COMMON BLINDING DISEASE IN PETS

The symptoms of glaucoma are subtle and often mimic other eye diseases; dilated pupil, enlargement of the eye, cloudiness within the cornea, excessive tearing, visual impairment or any head or eye trauma.

Early detection is important before irreversible damage in the eye lead to blindness and severe pain. The use of a tonometer in regular check ups can make a significant difference in saving a pet's vision.

Painless measurement doesn't require topical anesthesia and yet is barely noticed by the animal.
